

Human Interest Story at Walkabout Theater, Fellow Travelers at Stage Left, The Living at Famous Door, and Buying Time at Northlight. In his spare time he is a Gunslinger.

YUSSEF EL GUINDI (Playwright) Yussef is a playwright living in Seattle. This past fall, Silk Road Theatre Project produced the world premiere of El Guindi's Arab-American family dramedy Ten Acrobats in an Amazing Leap of Faith to great critical acclaim. His play Back of the Throat is winner of the 2004 Northwest Playwright's Competition. It was also nominated for the 2006 American Theatre Critics Association's Steinberg/New Play Award, and was voted Best New Play of 2005 by the Seattle Times. It was first staged by San Francisco's Thick Description and Golden Thread Productions; then later presented by Theater Schmeater in Seattle; Manbites Dog Theater in Durham, North Carolina; the Eccentric Theater Co. in Anchor-

age, Alaska; and the Flea Theater in New York. His two-related one-acts, Acts of Desire, were staged by the Fountain Theatre in Los Angeles. Other recent productions: Karima's City (in San Francisco and as part of 2004's Cairo International Experimental Theater Festival, both presented by Golden Thread Productions), Murder in the Mirror (a radio play presented by Stage Shadows at the Museum of Television and Radio in New York), and Men On Mars (another radio play aired in 2004 by Shoestring Radio Theater in San Francisco). His adaptation of Chekhov's A Marriage Proposal into an Arab-American setting was staged by the Arab Theatrical Arts Guild in Dearborn, Michigan and was nominated for several awards including Outstanding Achievement in Original Play or Adaptation. His short film, Love Stalks, won an award for best short narrative film at the Seattle Underground Film Festival and was aired on KTEH. His short story Ohio was recently published in Mizna; and another short story, Stage Directions for an Extended Conversation, was published in Dinarzad's Children, an anthology of Arab-American Fiction. Yussef holds an M.F.A. from Carnegie-Mellon University and was playwright-in-residence at Duke University.

STUART CARDEN (Director) Stuart is honored to return to SRTP after directing last fall's Ten Acrobats in an Amazing Leap of Faith. Recent regional credits include the U.S. premiere of Martin Crimp's adaptation of Mariyaux's The False Servant and the critically acclaimed remount of Marie Jones's Stones in his Pockets for Pittsburgh Irish and Classical Theatre (where he serves as artistic associate), the regional premiere of Tristine Skyler's The Moonlight Room and the 2004 & 2005 Young Playwrights Festival for The City Theatre and Charles Mee's Big Love for the No Name Players which garnered Pittsburgh's Ten Best Award of 2004. In Chicago and surrounding areas recent productions include The Crucible, The Game of Love and Chance, Life is a Dream, Ring Round the Moon, Private Eyes and Spring Awakening. Stuart received his M.F.A. in directing from Carnegie Mellon University (where he teaches each summer). In Chicago he teaches movement and viewpoints theory for Act One Studios' Two Year Acting Conservatory. Upcoming projects include Martin McDonagh's The Pillowman for Pittsburgh Irish and Classical Theatre and Stones in his Pockets for Madison Repertory Theatre.

JEFFERSON BURNS (Production Manager) Jefferson is honored to be working with Silk Road Theatre Project again for Back of the Throat. 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Letter from the Founders

Welcome to Silk Road Theatre Project at the historic Chicago Temple Building! In less than four years we have gone from an "idea" to the proud occupants of this beautiful new theatre. And what an amazing journey it has been. Adding a multi-cultural not-for-profit theatre company into the mix of Chicago's Loop Theatre District has been a dream we've shared for over two years now with our partners at First United Methodist Church at The Chicago Temple: a partnership destined to appear in the annuls of theatre history.

This new theatre is testimony to the enormous generosity and support of the First United Methodist community, and to the vision and intellectual acumen of Senior Pastor Philip Blackwell. In recognizing that both parties are in the business of telling stories, and that both share a belief in the transformative power of such stories, Rev. Blackwell set the stage for extending unprecedented levels of hospitality to a theatre company that is neither Methodist nor bound to any specific tradition or creed. As we see it, the relationship between the Temple and the Silk Road Theatre Project is a "natural fit."


