For 8 years Silk Road Rising has been working with 6th-12th grade Chicago Public School students on the Empathic Playwriting Intensive Course, EPIC. Additionally, last year we branched out to offer EPIC, with great success, to the older adult community. This summer, we partnered with After School Matters to increase EPIC's reach to an additional 70 students from all over Chicago. This expanded outreach is incredibly exciting and there is only more to come in 2020!


EPIC Showcase is our chance to highlight some of the creative, brilliant, and savvy students we had the pleasure of working with during the summer and fall. Over the course of 10 weeks, EPIC students work with a Silk Road Rising teaching artist to discover how to tell stories and practice empathy through the writing of a short play or monologue. The students make connections and build trust through theatre games and activities that encourage them to think outside themselves and look at the world through other perspectives.

Many of our CPS students have limited exposure to theatre and almost no exposure to playwriting, while many of our older adult participants mistakenly think their creative days are behind them. During EPIC, we guide students to self empowerment by giving them the tools to become confident storytellers and stretch their creative muscles through the act of writing a play. Underestimating older adults and young people is common among our communities and sometimes their stories get stifled and unheard. However, we believe those voices are sometimes the most important and enlightening voices in the room. Come with us on a journey of community fellowship as we give space for their creative voices to rise.

We would like to thank the more than 200 students who participated in EPIC this summer and fall and to congratulate our 8 playwrights who have been selected for the EPIC Showcase. They are proudly representing CPS schools Daniel Boone Elementary and Turner-Drew Elementary Language Academy, EPIC Playwriting at the Lutz Center for After School Matters, and Cantata-senior living community.

At the end of our training programs, each participant has created a ten-minute story expressing an issue that is meaningful to them. The power of our engagement comes from the fact that every participant is more skilled after our engagement. These playwriting skills stay with them so that over time, participants can develop more stories.
