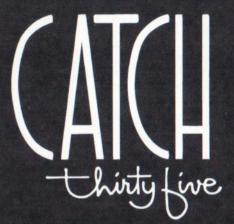

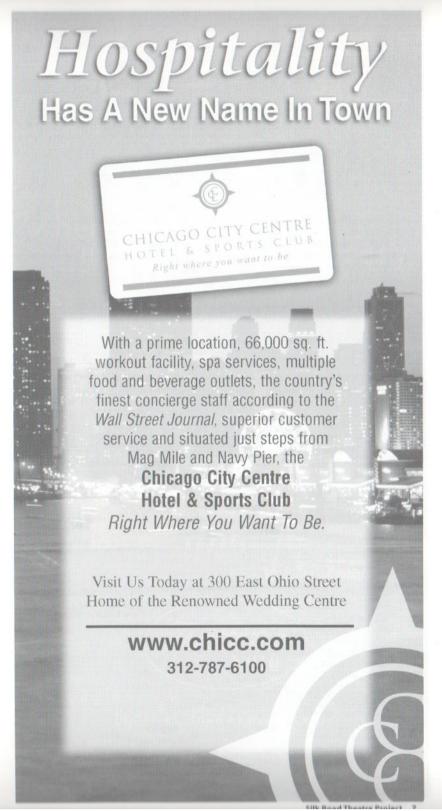
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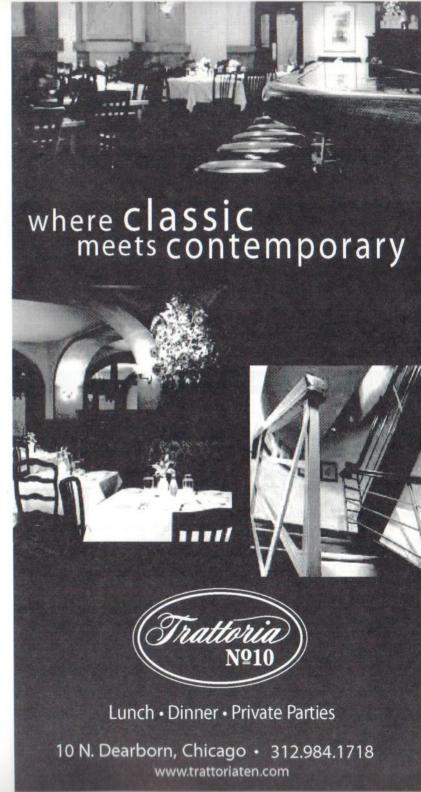
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ABOUT SILK ROAD THEATRE PROJECT

Mission

Silk Road Theatre Project showcases playwrights of Asian, Middle Eastern, and Mediterranean backgrounds, whose works address themes relevant to the peoples of the Silk Road and their Diaspora communities. Through the creation and presentation of outstanding theatre, we aim to promote discourse and dialogue among multi-cultural audiences in Chicago.

The Silk Road Stretched From Japan to Italy. So Does Our Theatre.

The term "Silk Road" refers to the great trade routes that originated in China and extended across Central and South Asia, the Middle East, and into Europe, from the 2nd century B.C. until about the 16th century A.D. The dominant land routes connected China to Syria, and adjoined to sea routes, creating an East-West corridor linking Japan to Italy. These transcontinental caravans resulted not only in trade, of which silk was an important commodity, but also in tremendous cross-cultural interaction among the peoples of the regions; interaction that fostered the exchange of ideas and the fusion of art and aesthetics.

The Silk Road is a legacy associated with rich traditions of oral narrative, epic poetry, and storytelling. Thus, the celebrated trade routes serve Silk Road Theatre Project both as a geographic guide as well as a metaphor for intercultural dialogue.

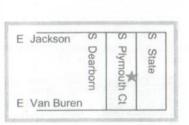

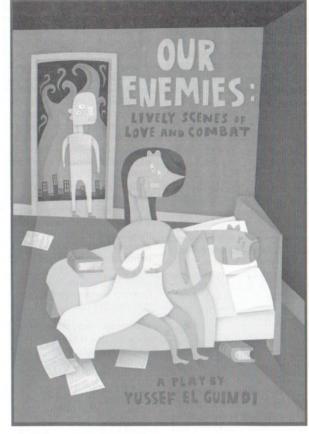
Shishir Kurup (Playwright) is an actor, writer, director, composer and ensemble member of the nationally renowned Cornerstone Theater Company. His modern verse play, Merchant

on Venice, received California Arts Council, Kennedy Center, and NEA/TCG Awards and was work-shopped at NY's Lark Theatre and L.A.'s East West Players and Mark Taper Forum. His plays On Caring for the Beast and As Vishnu Dreams played at the Currican Theater in NY and East West Players respectively, the latter receiving critic's pick from the L.A. Times and Weekly. His one-man show, Assimilation, is published in the anthology Bold Words: A Century of Asian American Writing. Shishir is one of only six people nationwide to receive the TIME (Time for Inspiration, Motivation and Exploration) Grant from the Audrey Skirball Foundation in recognition of his body of work. He's also a Princess Grace fellow and Herb Alpert nominee for theater. Last year he co-composed songs for and directed Cornerstone's twentieth anniversary show, Demeter in the City, at Redcat in Disney Hall written by MacArthur Fellow Sarah Ruhl. This June he directed Los Illegals written by new Cornerstone Artistic Director Michael John Garces with stories culled from and cast with the Los Angeles undocumented community.

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Shishir has an extensive TV and film list but was most recently on Lost, Sleeper Cell and played a recurring character on NBC's Surface. He currently recurs on Heroes.

Jamil Khoury (Artistic Director) is Founding Artistic Director of Silk Road Theatre Project, a position to which he brings extensive experience as a producer, playwright, and cross-cultural consultant. He is honored to be promoting the cultural production of Silk Road peoples and to be fostering the exchange of ideas within Chicago's theatre community. Khoury's vocation as a playwright lends a valuable currency to fulfilling our mission as a playwright driven theatre. His plays focus on Middle Eastern themes and questions of Diaspora. He is particularly interested in the intersections of culture, national identity, sexuality, and class. Khoury holds a M.A. degree in Religious Studies from The University of Chicago Divinity School and a B.S. degree in International Relations from Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service. He is an occasional instructor for The University of Chicago Graham School of General Studies, where he develops courses in Middle East Studies. Khoury's play Precious Stones won Gay Chicago Magazine's 2003 After Dark Award for Outstanding New Work and has been performed in ten cities across the U.S.

His play Fitna was performed at University Theatre of The University of Chicago and his play Azizati was performed at Café Voltaire. Khoury serves on the Board of Directors of The League of Chicago Theatres.

Malik Gillani (Executive Director) is Founding Executive Director of Silk Road Theatre Project, a position to which he brings extensive experience in producing, management, and business development. He is thrilled to be promoting both the rich cultural legacy of the Silk Road and greater visibility for Silk Road artists. LETTER FROM THE FOUNDERS

Welcome to Silk Road Theatre Project's world premiere production of Shishir Kurup's *Merchant on Venice*! Where the Bard Meets Bollywood. And at the risk of sounding immodest, you're in for one of the most unique and exciting theatre experiences to come along in years! *Merchant on Venice*, is, at once, a modern adaptation of Shakespeare's similarly titled classic (give or take a preposition) and an entirely new piece of dramatic literature. So while it stands on its own as a distinct new play, and a distinctly American play, it maintains a lively and intimate dialogue with its Elizabethan predecessor.

Shishir Kurup is a writer to be reckoned with. A fiercely original dramatist endowed with a sharp intellect and a theatrical prowess that both marvels and unsettles. His lucid command of language assumes a rhythmic pulse, unleashing a playful repartee with metaphor and double entendre. Shishir is, quite frankly, creating his own set of rules with delicious results. He is conscientious. He is subversive. He is not afraid to be confrontational. And he is wickedly funny.

Rarely does a play so evoke the mission and aesthetic of Silk Road Theatre Project as *Merchant on Venice* does. It satisfies both artistically and politically. For some time now we have been searching for a play that manages to explore the ever-sensitive terrain of Hindu-Muslim relations within a complex and compassionate storyline. As such pieces go the tendency seems to favor petty partisanship and tired stereotypes. That is not the case with *Merchant on Venice*. Kurup shares with us a recognition that the relationship between Hindus and Muslims in South Asia is way too "big" and multi-faceted and intersected and overlapped to explain away in sound bites. Nor can it be reduced to an "opposing teams" paradigm. It is a relationship that is affectionate and adversarial, intimate and estranged, unifying and divisive. Thus, we have found in this play a kindred spirit of sorts, an affirmation of our own journeys, both within the South Asian Diaspora, and within the always rich, sometimes conflicted arenas that bond Hindus and Muslims together.

This past July Silk Road hosted DESI DRAMA: The First National South Asian American Theatre Conference (July 19 – 22, 2007). The historic conference marked the first-ever organized gathering of South Asian American theatre artists and professionals from across the U.S. Among the issues explored was the imperative of developing a canon of South Asian American plays. How fitting for us then that the first play we're producing post-Desi Drama is the work of an Indian-American playwright. And how apropos that the momentum garnered at the conference is fueling a play we believe will become a centerpiece of that emerging canon.

LETTER FROM THE PLAYWRIGHT



I wrote *Merchant on Venice* simply to satisfy a thirst to see and hear the faces and sounds of the South Asian Diaspora on an American Stage. I wanted to take a sliver of a culture, in all its diversity and varied idiosyncrasies, write to those specificities, perhaps excavate something more universal and hopefully burn away the merely exotic.

India is one of the few and possibly only places in the world where Elizabethan syntax is still used in everyday speech. I found it interesting that while the form had all but disappeared in its native country it was still alive and at home in one of its former colonies.

I was born and raised in three of these colonies: India, Kenya and the United States, so it made sense to use the meter to explore how my brain had been formed through the language grooves of my adopted tongue and hoped to find in the exploration a connection between these former colonies.

It's oddly moving to me (and annoyingly Gunga Din-y) that the colonized are asked to hold onto the discarded debris of the colonizer. Given to us for safekeeping I suppose. In time, these bits of culture and language that aren't our own float though the make-up of our identity and become a part of our DNA. Writing in this form has felt like a search for home. A voice. An identity.

It wasn't until Cornerstone Theater and the Audrey Skirball-Kenis Theater commissioned a project called LA Visions/LA Voices, co-created by my friend and colleague Bill Rauch, that *Merchant* got written. The initiative was to locate various plays in specific parts of Los Angeles and to write from that perspective. I set my piece on the corner of Clarington and Venice Blvd., a part of town with an incredibly complex racial mix where Thai restaurants are kitty corner to Brazilian, Mediterranean and Cuban restaurants and where Hindu temples are proximate to Halal meat shops. I used the bones of the very problematic and complicated *Merchant of Venice* to make *Merchant on Venice*. I wanted to confront the bigotry and ugliness as well as the grace and beauty that permeates Shakespeare's play. I replaced the bones that felt thin and brittle, maintained the complexity of the anti-hero without apologizing for his actions and moved it into the 21st century by exploring the cultural clash of religions in this post 9-11 world. Discarding its skin and flesh I rebuilt it within the rhythms, mindset and musicality of South Asia. I hope that in the remaking we've found both a South-Asian and an American experience.

My immense gratitude to Jamil Khoury, Malik Gillani and Stuart Carden for taking the initiative in producing this play and giving me a home here at the visionary Silk Road Theatre Project whose brilliant mission is at once fiercely specific, broadly inclusive and beautifully inspiring.

Babri Masjid – mosque burned down in the violence that centered around the alleged burial site of the Hindu King Rama

bhai - brother

Bollywood – a slightly derogatory reference to the largest film industry in the world

Bora - Muslims from the Shia sect of Islam known for their keen business sense

Brahmin - the Hindu priestly class

chalo - "let's go"

Chopra – refers to Deepak Chopra, allopathic and ayurvedic Doctor turned self-help guru

crore - 10 million rupees - equal to about \$250,000 nowadays

ende ammende nair – "my mother's husband;" a wry expression of surprise (Malayalam)

Fateh Ali Khan – Nusrat Fateh Ali Khan; a famous Quawali singer garam masala – a hot mix of spices

Guju – slang reference to a Gujarati; people from the north of India

habari gani my rafikis three? – "how are you my three friends?" (mix of Swahili and English)

Halal – a set of Islamic dietary laws which regulate the preparation of food

Holi - Hindu harvest festival of colors and celebration

kheer - north Indian Rice pudding

kurta - an oversized Indian shirt, usually made of cotton

lakhs - 100,000 Rupees (around \$2,000)

Malayalam - the language of Kerala (a state in south India)

Mapla – a South Indian, slightly dismissive, reference to a Muslim or a Christian; a non-Hindu

mera bhajia, tera bhajia, garam, garam, chalo chalo – "my fritter, your fritter, hot, hot, let's go, let's go"

Mulloo – slang for Malayalees (Malayalam speakers from the southern state of Kerala)

Mussellman - a Muslim

muzuri sana – "very good" (Swahili)

Net IP - Network of Indian Professionals

NRI - Non-Resident Indian

panjanridhm - a dessert used as offering; considered nectar of the gods

Pujari – one who performs a puja; a priest or minister

Rama – the ideal Man; husband of Sita and king of ancient Ayodhya

Ramadan – a time of fasting, worship and contemplation lasting a month; Islamic holiday

SABU - South Asian Businessman's Union and a character in 1950's B-Films

Santana – famous Mexican-American guitar player

Sita - the ideal woman; wife of King Rama

South Asian – the peoples of Bangladesh, Bhutan, India, Maldives, Nepal, Pakistan and Sri Lanka. The South Asian Diaspora is the scattering of these peoples all over the globe.

tere baab ki gahnd meh ekh chandini hay – "in your father's arse there is a moon" tere baab ki ghar meh – "in your father's house"

wog - derogatory term for an Indian.

mog delogatory territor artificiant

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
