Armed with a few dozen original cast recordings, I selected a bunch of my favorite songs and enlisted the brilliant creativity of director Elizabeth Margolius, music director Gary Powell, and a stellar group of performers. As you're about to see, Silk Road Cabaret is a playful and ironic twist on our commitment to showcasing playwrights of Asian, Middle Eastern, and Mediterranean backgrounds. We're calling it a 'departure piece.' The composers and lyricists who created these Broadway musicals were not of Silk Road backgrounds. Yet for millions of Americans they created what became these almost 'iconic representations' of Silk Road peoples.
