

# About Silk Road Theatre Project

#### Mission

Silk Road Theatre Project showcases playwrights of Asian, Middle Eastern, and Mediterranean backgrounds, whose works address themes relevant to the peoples of the Silk Road and their Diaspora communities. Through the creation and presentation of outstanding theatre, we aim to promote discourse and dialogue among multi-cultural audiences in Chicago.

### The "Spark"

Silk Road Theatre Project is a creative response to the attacks of September 11, 2001. The consequences of that catastrophic day are sure to reverberate for years to come, posing unique and urgent challenges for artists of all backgrounds, and inspiring us to educate, promote dialogue, and heel rifts through the transformative power of theatre.

Company co-founders and life partners, Malik Gillani and Jamil Khoury, felt galvanized to respond to the anti-Arab and anti-Muslim sentiments that swept the U.S. in the aftermath of the attacks. Their hope was to counter negative representation of Middle Eastern and Muslim peoples with representation that was authentic, multi-faceted, and grounded in human experience. That theatre would be the medium in which they'd "create change" was a given; a decision dictated by their mutual love of theatre, and Khoury's vocation as a playwright.

Their idea quickly expanded beyond the Middle East to encompass that vast geographical area known historically as the "Silk Road;" a territory stretching from China to Italy and a legacy associated with rich traditions of oral narrative, epic poetry, and storytelling. Silk Road Theatre Project thus officially came into existence in the summer of 2002.

His adaptation of Chekhov's A Marriage Proposal into an Arab-American setting was staged by the Arab Theatrical Arts Guild in Dearborn, Michigan, and was nominated for several PAGE awards including Outstanding Achievement in an Original Play or Adaptation. His short stories, Habibi and Ohio are to be published in the Seattle Review and Mizna respectively. Another short story, Stage Directions for an Extended Conversation was recently published in Dinarzad's Children, an anthology of Arab-American Fiction. Yussef holds an M.F.A. from Carnegie-Mellon University and was playwright-in-residence at Duke University.




As we see it, the relationship between the Temple and Silk Road Theatre Project is a "natural fit."

### Chicago's oldest church (b.1831) is alive with new ideas!


"Come and see..."
